

Scoutmaster of the Year - Recognize a Scoutmaster who not only performs his/her duties within their unit but frequently goes above and beyond those duties for the benefit of the youth in their unit.

Crew/Post Advisor of the Year - Recognize a unit leader who not only performs his/her duties within their unit but frequently goes above and beyond those duties for the benefit of the youth in the unit.

Den Leader of the Year - Recognize one of your pack's den leaders who not only perform their job as den leader within their pack but frequently goes above and beyond for the benefit of the youth and their unit.

Committee Chair of the Year - Do you have an amazing committee chair in your troop crew or pack? Then you want to nominate them for this award. These leaders frequently go above and beyond for the benefit of the youth and their unit. Commissioner of the Year - Commissioners are the connection between the unit and their Council. Their goals are to be 1: the single, best resource for your unit; 2: ensure S.A.F.E programs; and 3: enable significant, sustainable growth. Nominate a commissioner who has been there for your unit this past year, reaching these goals and adding advice and experience to your leaders.

Salt Shaker Award - Nominate a leader in your Troop, Pack, Crew, or Post who has jumped in and done what needs to be done, filled in where needed, added great ideas, and, in general, added spice to your program! Fundraising Hero - We all know those who take on the job of popcorn kernel and fundraising chairs put in a lot of hard work in ordering, keeping track of popcorn, trading, calculating, organizing booths, and often donating not only their time but their space to make sure the unit has what is needed for your unit and scouts to fund their adventure.

Good Turn Award - Nominate a unit or individual who has provided outstanding community service projects in our community

District Award of Merit - Available to registered Scouters who render outstanding service at the district level (please list below all District level events they've helped with). This is the highest award given to a Scouter at the District level and the only "non-square knot" in the knot award group. A District awards the District Award of Merit to volunteer adults for service to youth.

The Scouting America Vision Statement reads "The Boy Scouts of America will prepare every eligible youth in America to become a responsible, participating citizen and leader who is guided by the Scout Oath and Law." As much as we'd like, some youths do not have easy access to, or are not initially drawn to, our traditional units. That mean s we must find additional ways to gain their interest. One of these methods is where Scoutreach comes in.

Scoutreach is a subset of units that are under the umbrella of the Impact District of the Cornhusker Council. You won't find them at a Camporee or a Day Camp, but you may have heard them mentioned a few times and wondered exactly what it was everyone was talking about. To put it simply, we're talking about reaching those youth that might otherwise look for some other influence.

For our Council, Scoutreach units take the shape of after school Cub Scout Clubs. Students at various elementary schools around Lincoln, and one in Nebraska City, meet once a week to get a small taste of what we teach our Scouts in our regular den meetings. Much like our traditional units, our club leaders run a range of experience, from college students needing volunteer hours, to Eagle Scouts, to registered Scouters that are already wearing a few hats in the Council. They take the time in the afternoons to go to the schools and bring aspects of our program to those students in hopes that they will take some of that knowledge home with them, and that they have some fun in the process.

Now, we have a few of our traditional Scouts who are also enrolled in the Cub Scout Club at their school. We want to turn the flow in the opposite direction. We are making strides to recruit students who are enrolled in our Scoutreach units into their nearest traditional Cub Scout Pack. If our clubs, we will be encouraging our students to enroll in traditional Cub Scout packs and talking up how much more they can get out of them. For our Cubmasters, that means making sure your unit pins on my.scouting are up to date and active. That also means responding to the email alerts immediately. Finally, if possible, if you or your unit is close to a school with a Scoutreach club and would like to help in any way, please reach out to District Executive Drew Wicks. Any collaboration will only help bring those kids into our traditional units.

Welcome to the 2026 Jamboree!

It is not too early to start planning for the 2026 National Jamboree to be held at Summit Bechtel Reserve, WV July 22-31, 2026! The National Jamboree is a gathering of thousands of members of the Boy Scouts of America, usually held every four years and organized by the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America. Referred to as "the Jamboree", "Jambo", or NSJ, Scouts from all over the nation and world have the opportunity to attend. The first jamboree was scheduled to be held in 1935 in Washington, D.C. to celebrate the 25th anniversary of



Scouting, but was delayed two years after being cancelled due to a polio outbreak. The 1937 jamboree in Washington attracted 25,000 Scouts, who camped around the Washington Monument and Tidal Basin. For more information on the 2026 Jamboree, visit <u>Home - National Jamboree</u>.

We will be sending two units to the Jamboree, one Troop of 40 Scouts (Boys) and one Crew of 20 Scouts (Boys and Girls). More information on how to register is forthcoming and will be shared on the Jamboree page on our website (Cornhusker Council Jamboree Link: <u>2026 National Jamboree</u>).

BSA RANGE SAFETY TRAINING

Range & Target Activities | Boy Scouts of America (scouting.org)

Range Activity SAFEty Training is now available online. All Scouts BSA troops, Venturing crews, and Sea Scout ships who provide unit-level sponsored/planned range and target activities must have at least one registered unit leader 21+ years of age take the Range Activity SAFEty online training available on <u>my.scouting.org</u>. This individual must be present at the range during the range and target activity(s). Participating in this training will help ensure a unit understands Scouting America's range and target activities policies.

This training is not required for District/Council-led range and target activities and is not a replacement for certified instructors who must be present to operate ranges per the Guide to Safe Scouting & National Range and Target Activities Manual.

-New training required for all SBSA troops who provide unit-level range and target activities (at least 1 leader trained over 21 who is present)

-This training is renewed every 2 years similar to Hazardous Weather and other trainings.

-No in-person training is available. This is online/mobile-only training.

-This does not replace the required certified instructors per GTSS & National Range and Target Activities Manual.

To access the updated training, log onto <u>my.Scouting.org</u> and search the catalog in the BSA Learn Center for "Range Activity SAFEty." For additional information regarding Scouting's Range and Target Activities, please refer to the Guide to Safe Scouting and the National Range and Target Activities Manual.
