

The Scoutreach program is not just here to run our after-school clubs. We're also doing everything we can to help recruit these Scouts into traditional units. As mentioned in previous articles, Scoutreach brings Scouting values to neighborhoods in Lincoln that don't have any, or very few traditional units. We also reach out to students who may not be able to easily afford Scouting or whose families may not have easy access to what we do.

Much of what we do through Scoutreach is exactly what we teach otherwise. We have lessons on first aid, the six essentials, and proper care for the American flag. We also make sure they learn the Scout Oath and Law, so that they have the foundation if they move into a traditional Pack. Of course, we bring the fun as well. Rocket building, game design, and physics in the form of catapults are also part of our curriculum. We even tie in the outdoors by having them work together to set up a tent. And, of course, you can't have a Cub Scout based program without a Pinewood Derby! We spend a few weeks working with the Scouts in the clubs to help them color, build, and race their own car.

As the quarter shifts, some of our clubs will change what students attend. For those that we may be losing to other clubs next quarter, Scoutreach is sending information home with these Scouts encouraging them to join their nearest traditional Pack. Along with a congratulations for completing this session of clubs, we're sending them to beascout.org to find their nearest Pack. This is the time for unit leaders to make sure unit pins are updated as well as to check alerts in the event that there are inquiries or sign-ups. Even one or two of these Scouts joining moving from a Club Pack to a Traditional Pack is a huge move. We have to make sure we're ready for as many of them as possible.



MESSENGER OF PEACE, MAR 14TH

Come learn about the Messenger of Peace awards and participate in a service project of kindness. Learn to fold butterflies, make milkweed seed packs, and find out a bit about Nebraska's butterflies. All folded butterflies go to the Children's Hospital's Rainbow House, the April cancer center, and the 'I have a name' shelter. The milkweed seeds are to help the monarch butterfly. Participants must actively participate for 2 hours to complete the award.



Messengers of Peace

What is Messengers of Peace?

Welcome to the Messengers of Peace program in Scouting America. World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM) created Messengers of Peace in 2011, to encourage Scouts around the world to step up and do what they can to make the world a little better. The MoP program falls under WOSM's Better World Framework.

Messengers of Peace aims to promote a culture of peace and dialogue for mutual understanding, promote service initiatives led by Scouts, support the development of young people affected by conflict situations, provide further connection to the UN's Sustainable Development Goals and connect Scouts around the world in a global network of 20 million Messengers of Peace.

WOSM has defined 3 Dimensions within which we can build a culture of peace and create positive change in our world today: MESSENGERS OF PEACE | BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA

WILDERNESS FIRST AID TRAINING, MAR 22-23

Wilderness First Aid Training focuses on the prevention, assessment, and treatment for an ill or injured person in a remote environment where definitive care by a physician and/or rapid transport is not readily available. This course is intended for anyone planning a remote high adventure experience, including BSA High Adventure Bases.



Participants must be at least 12 years old at the time of the course, registered with the BSA, and hold a current First Aid/CPR certification.

This course requires active participation and for all skills to be demonstrated with minimal prompting to obtain certification. We will be doing some activities outside and kneeling or laying on the ground, so please dress accordingly or have extra clothing. We will be doing scenarios where gear may be used for improvised support. We encourage bringing your own gear so that everyone can see what may potentially be used in an emergency. We will also have examples and practice kits available. Lunch is provided. Bringing snacks are encouraged. Please let us know of any dietary concerns.

Course (Approx. 16 hours). Skills Practice Approx. (4 hours)

YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID, MARCH 29TH, 2025

Mental Health First Aid is an international evidence-based education program proven to be effective in teaching adults how to recognize and respond to signs and symptoms of mental health and substance use challenges. Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) is designed to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, health and human services workers, and other caring citizens how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing a mental health or substance use challenge or is in crisis.



Youth Mental Health First Aid is primarily designed for adults who regularly interact with young people. The course introduces common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development, and teaches a 5-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations. Topics covered include anxiety, depression, substance use, disorders in which psychosis may occur, disruptive behavior disorders (including ADHD), and eating disorders.

"While reading the sacred texts of their faith, Scouts will be part of a larger movement of other Scouts doing the same and, in the process, learn more about their faith traditions.

"Through the support of their fellow Scouts, and by understanding their faith better, Scouts can grow closer to God and learn what He wants them to do to become a better person."

For last year's event, nearly 4,000 youth read their sacred texts for more than 800 combined hours.

How to participate: Most Scouts will set aside some time to read the sacred text of their religion at home with their families on the evening of May 1. You can also do it at your place of worship or wherever else you please.

Now is a good time to consult with your religious leader or have a family discussion about which portion of the text might be good to read on that day. Scouting America, in partnership with USA Triathlon, is pleased to announce the launch of a new Multisport Merit Badge designed to recognize and celebrate the achievements of Scouts who learn about physical endurance activities and lifestyle. The Multisport Merit Badge can create a fun and accessible entry-point for Scouts to try out a new recreational or vocational pursuit while gaining key life skills and promoting healthy lifestyles.



The Multisport Merit Badge will be earned by Scouts who demonstrate proficiency in a combination of swimming, cycling, and running through a series of age-appropriate challenges and skill-building activities. The program will offer different levels of achievement, allowing Scouts to progress and develop their skills over time by encouraging physical and mental fitness.

Scouts will need to participate in two sports for at least one season while following a structured plan to track progress and improve their skills. Here's what the process looks like:

- 1. Choose Two Sports: Scouts must pick two endurance-based sports to focus on. These can be swimming, biking, running, or a combination of two.
- 2. Get a Physical: A healthcare professional must complete a Scout medical examination form to ensure Scouts are ready for the physical demands of the activities.
- 3. Create a Training Plan: With the help of a merit badge counselor, Scouts will develop a training program for each sport that outlines their goals, practice schedule, and progress tracking.
- 4. Track Your Progress: Scouts will document their training, practice sessions, and improvement over time. This helps them stay accountable and see how they're developing their skills.
- 5. Participate for a Full Season: Scouts must commit to each sport for at least one season, whether competing individually or on a team.
- 6. Reflect on the Experience: After completing the season, Scouts will discuss what they learned, how the sports challenged them, and how the experience affected them physically and mentally.
- 7. Submit Your Blue Card: Once all requirements are completed, Scouts will submit their blue card to their unit leader to record their achievement in ScoutBook.

5. INDIVIDUAL REGISTRATION RENEWAL

5.A. Parents and leaders can renew their registration online 2-months before the membership expires.

My. Scouting displays a reminder notice in the upper right corner upon login when your registration is due to renew within two months

A membership renewal notices is also sent via email with a link that can be used to renew the registration. The notice will be sent 60, 30, 14, 7, and 1 day(s) out, as well as 1 week after expiration until the registration is renewed.

In My.Scouting, click on the red notification icon to open the renewal page.

5.B. Positions eligible to renew will be listed. If more than one position, make sure the appropriate one is selected as primary.

That is the one that will show you as paid. This is also your opportunity to change which is marked as primary if needed.

Review to ensure everything looks correct, then click on the "Go To Payment" button.



5.C. You will be prompted to sign and agree to Scouting America's Terms and Conditions, jult like you did when you joined Scouting America (Please review before signing).

Click on "Go To Checkout Summary."

- **5.D.** The checkout page shows the fees to pay and allows you to adjust the Scout Life Magazine Subscription. NOTE: The default is to subscribe. You will need to "uncheck" the box if you do not wish to subscribe. Proceed to enter your Credit Card information.
- **5.E.** The payment process will default to the billing address record on file. Please confirm this address compared to the card you are using. If the Credit Card has a different address, you can change it. Click on "Place Order."
- **5.F.** Once the Credit Card process is completed, your receipt will be displayed. Click on the "Complete Registration" option at the bottom and you will be directed back to your applications in My.Scouting.







OA ELECTIONS



The Golden Sun Lodge is holding OA Elections. Chapter Election Coordinators will be working with Troops to schedule these elections on Lodgemaster and will be asking Arrowmen to assist with these. Requirements for eligibility:

- Be a registered member of Scouting America.
- Have experienced 15 nights of Scout camping while registered with a troop, crew, or ship within the two years immediately prior to the election. The 15 nights must include one, but no more than one, long-term camp consisting of at least five consecutive nights of overnight camping, approved and under the auspices and standards of Scouting America. Only five nights of the long-term camp may be credited toward the 15-night camping requirement; the balance of the camping (10 nights) must be overnight, weekend, or other short-term camps of, at most, three nights each. Ship nights may be counted as camping for Sea Scouts.
- At the time of their election, youth must be under the age of 21, and hold one of the following ranks corresponding to the type unit in which they are being considered for election: Scouts BSA First Class rank, the Venturing Discovery rank, or the Sea Scout Ordinary rank or higher, and following approval by the Scoutmaster, Crew Advisor or Sea Scout Skipper, be elected by the youth members of their unit.
- Adults (age 21 or older) who meet the camping requirements may be selected following nomination to and approval by the lodge adult selection committee.

Linens or sleeping bag, beds are mattress only, cabins are heated however


General Notes:

CORNHUSKER HISTORY

As Scouting America celebrated its 115th Anniversary, we thought we should share a bit of our history. The Cornhusker Council can trace its origins back to 1917 when the Lincoln Council was formed. Our oldest active Troops - Troop 12 and Troop 16 - actually predate the formation of the Lincoln Council. Here is the Council's newsletter from Mar 1924. Of interest, James E. West, the Chief Scout Executive attended the Council's Feb 2024 Court of Honor and presented the Eagle Scout Award to Billy Ungles from Troop 21.
