Make sure units are aware of the Cornhusker Council Membership Plan 2025:

Commissioner's Role in Retention:

In the coming months we will be asking commissioners to contact "lapsed" youth and adults of the unit(s) they serve. A "lapsed" youth/adult is one whose membership was not renewed by the deadline. This "lapsed" period is for 90 days at which point they will be dropped from the Scouting program. Our goal will be to determine the reason(s) each membership was not renewed — it may be because the unit neglected to renew the membership, the meeting day/time may not work for the family, etc. The next step will be to assist the family find another unit if they are interested. All data collected will be used to improve retention rates in the future across the council.

A "script" to use for these conversations is in development and will be shared with commissioners who will be asked to make these contacts. Thank you for your future assistance with these contacts.

Commissioner Tools Update from Nat'l Commissioner Service Team:

Due to the complexity of the changes required, the updates will be released by late February. Keeping Cub Scouts Engaged:

As the weather warms and nature begins to bloom, spring offers a perfect opportunity for units to provide engaging outdoor programming that excites Cub Scouts and encourages participation.

Spring Nature Hikes: Add themed scavenger hunts or badge-related activities

Outdoor Skills Workshops: Knot-tying, shelter building, fishing, and basic first aid provide hands-on experiences while preparing Cub Scouts for future adventures

Themed Adventures:

- Pirate Adventures: Include treasure hunts, map reading, and water-related activities
- Wild West Days: Introduce simple outdoor cooking, play "old-fashioned" games
- Superhero Training Camp: Obstacle courses, teamwork challenges, and problemsolving activities

Family Picnic or Campout: Feature simple games, nature walk and a campfire program

Outdoor STEM Programs: Build weather stations, bird houses, explore solar energy

Springtime Cub Olympics: Feature ageappropriate challenges like sack races, relay races, tug-of-war and water bucket relays

Spring Service Projects: Park clean-ups, plant flowers or trees, repair trails

Safety Moment —

5 Things to Think about when asking Scouts to Camp in the Cold:



1. Ask parents to pack with their child, but not for their child

The advantage of having a child pack their own bag is twofold. First, it helps them learn what they need on a winter campout. And second, it helps them remember where each item was packed. The first time a Scout learns what's inside their bag should not be when they arrive at their campsite.

2. Make sure everyone has plenty to eat and drink

Prepared soups and stews can be heated up in a matter of minutes.

And remember: Drinking fluids is as important in wintry conditions as it is during hot-weather adventures. Encourage everyone to drink up regularly.

3. Plan the right activities

It's not a good idea to perspire in the winter. Wet clothing isn't only uncomfortable, it can be dangerous. Remind Scouts to shed a layer if they begin to feel too hot.
